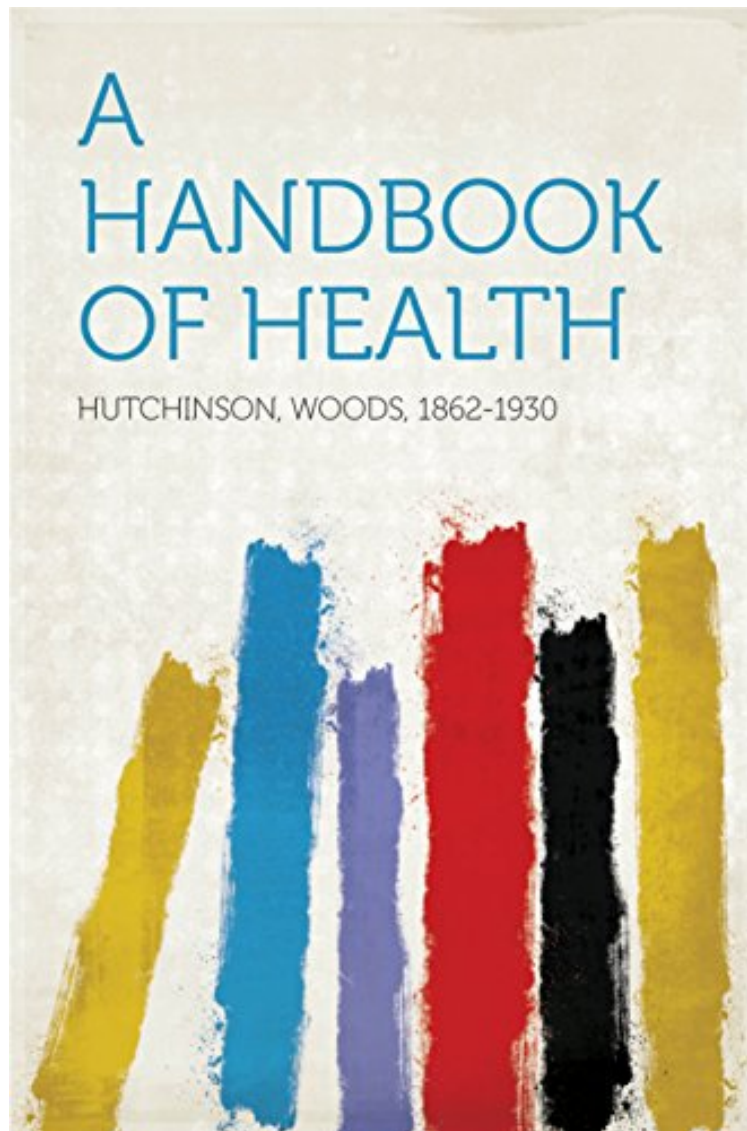

He worked as a professor of anatomy at the State University of Iowa between 1891 and 1896 and then became a professor of comparative pathology at the University of Buffalo until 1900. While at Buffalo, he also edited *The Polyclinic* and lectured at the London Medical Graduates' College and the University of London, starting in 1899. Besides *The Polyclinic*, he edited *Vis Medicatrix* early in his career, (from 1890 to 1891). In 1903, he became the Oregon State Health Officer; he held that post for two years. Following the post in Oregon, he became a professor of clinical medicine at the New York Polyclinic. He was the author of *The Gospel According to Darwin* (1898), *Studies in Human and Comparative Pathology* (1901), *Instinct and Health* (1908), *Preventable Diseases* (1909), *Conquest of Consumption* (1910), *Exercise and Health* (1911), *A Handbook of Health* (1911), *The Child's Day* (1912), *Common Diseases* (1913) and *Civilization and Health* (1914).
