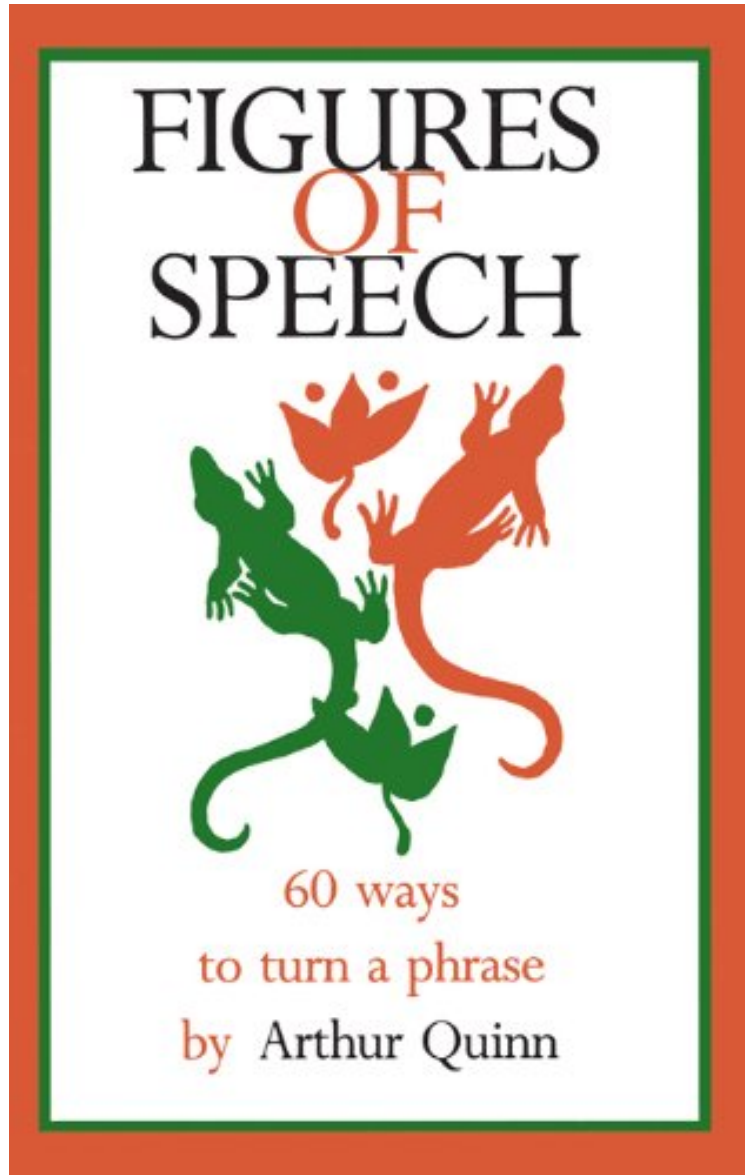

However, this edition is typeset abysmally, with smeared, uneven ink, huge margins, poor-quality paper; this looks like the output of one of those soulless print-on-demand services. Do yourself a favor and buy the first edition, if you can find it, or just get the ebook: at least then you can tweak its appearance for a better read.
